A new youth center has been opened in Kengtung City where Tan and I have been encouraging a group of young people as they seek ways to respond to the needs of youth in the city. It's entirely initiated by the young people themselves. And the authorities are not only allowing them to do it, but are saying that possibly next year, they will provide financial support to keep it open! The youth of Kentung now have a safe place to come and hang out and enjoy their friends, play sports and games and just have healthy fun.

The Bala Foundation, run by our friend Misaw Chermer, has opened the Bala House. The Bala House is a coffee shop and restaurant, and acts as a social enterprise to complement the Bala Foundation's efforts to be a link between the various anti-trafficking efforts in the Chiang Rai area.
